AWARD-WINNING GOT 2B SAFE! PROGRAM HONORS ST LOUIS TEACHER WITH \$10,000 CLASSROOM MAKEOVER AT BECKY-DAVID ELEMENTARY SCHOOL IN ST. CHARLES, MO ON MONDAY, OCTOBER 11, 2010

WHAT:

- To help protect our nation's children, Honeywell partnered with the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children® in creating the first-ever school-based national abduction prevention program Got 2B Safe! Think Smart. Take Charge. Developed in 2005, the program recognizes teachers with the greatest commitment to child safety.
- This year, 5 grand-prize winning teachers from across the country will receive classroom makeovers valued at \$10,000; and another 100 first-prize winning teachers will receive gift certificates for classroom supplies valued at \$500.

WHO:

- You have a local Grand Prize Winner whose lesson plan stood out from hundreds submitted: Karen Anne Garsaa, a 2nd grade teacher at St. Charles Becky-David Elementary School, who will reveal her winning \$10,000 classroom makeover to her students, faculty, family, and other members of the community.
- Ms. Garsaa created a unique football-themed event to reinforce the overall "goals" of the Got 2B Safe! rules by implementing her "safety blitz" lesson plan within a football-themed game. During Super Goal week a different rule was spotlighted each day until Friday when two teams went head-to-head to solve child safety problems. With a correct answer they moved ahead 10 yards or a penalty back 10 yards - until one team won! Honeywell will present Ms. Garsaa with an award for her efforts and dedication to protecting children.

WHY:

- According to the U.S. Department of Justice, more than 800,000 children may be reported missing in a single year: that's an average of more than 2,100 each day. Most of these children are recovered quickly and safely, but there are many who are still missing.
- The Got 2B Safe! program has been distributed to more than 72,000 U.S. elementary schools, reaching more than 5 million students, and teaches critical and potentially life-saving lessons to eight to ten year olds through four simple and specific rules:

- 1. Check First** -- Children should always check with parents and guardians before accepting gifts, rides or invitations from anyone, including friends, acquaintances and people they don't know.
- 2. Go With a Friend** -- Simple and straightforward -- never go anywhere alone. Being with another person in public is safer and more fun.
- 3. It's My Body** -- Anyone who violates the sanctity of a child's body or threatens or attempts to do so is committing a crime. Tell your children it is okay to say "NO!"
- 4. Tell a Trusted Adult** -- Teach your children to TELL a trusted adult -- parent, guardian, teacher, etc. -- if anyone or anything makes them feel scared, uncomfortable or confused.
